Wristbands and Fistula Covers

The wristbands come in two sizes (21 cm and 24cm) and are printed with the words "No BP No Needles this Arm". The fistula covers are of various lengths and widths as well as colours. If you can spare a coin, to help us purchase additional material etc, that would be great—but not compulsory.

Fingerless Gloves

Pairs of gloves, sizes S,M,L, made of UPF 40-50 Lycra are available at office. \$4 for pictured length and \$3 for usual glove length. Also available merino gloves for covering post skin lesion treatment.

Concerning sun protection, from articles read, if specially treated fabric isn't available, it's best to choose darker colours, and tight-weave fabrics. Hold the fabric up to the light, if you can see through it the sun can get through it.

BAY OF PLENTY RENAL PATIENT COUNCIL

Over 2022 and 2023 the Bay of Plenty established their first ever patient council for renal services in their rohe. The idea for the group was seen as an important foundation stone for the developing renal service. With concepts of mahitahi and co-design being recognised as key elements in service design, there were community meetings held in both Eastern and Western Bay areas to socialise the idea. Letters were then sent out to all renal patients in the BOP asking for expressions of interest to be members of the patient council.

Key aspects for members included:

- 1. To be representative of the local population i.e. many renal patients in BOP are Māori and the group needed to reflect this.
- 2. A broad range of perspectives i.e. advanced kidney care, transplant, haemo dialysis and PD patients should all be represented. A whānau voice was also seen as important.
- 3. Members are independent of Hauora \bar{a} Toi Bay of Plenty to ensure that any bias towards the needs of the organisation are mitigated and that the voice of patients will be heard.

Key aspirations of the group are :

- 1. Uphold commitments to Te Tiriti O Waitangi and enable a mahitahi (collaborative co-design) Kaupapa Maori approach within the service.
- 2. Have awareness of the strategic vision for the renal service.
- 3. Identify and discuss issues of concern.
- 4. Identify and propose new ideas or projects.
- 5. Provide external expertise or insight.
- 6. Ensure the service is developed in partnership with patients and their whanau.
- 7. Raise the profile of renal service.

The members were chosen from the returned expressions of interest.

The group first met in Feb of 2023 and the year has been spent building relationships within the group and socialising the existence of the group to key stake holders. It is recognised that the sustainability of the group is assured by strong relationships as a core element. Terms of reference have been created, along with agenda formats. Key roles have taken time to appoint but we now have a chairperson, Rick Rapana. The group has a central email, a Facebook page and are creating the first newsletter.

We are looking forward to 2024 so we can link in more closely with the kidney community. We want to elevate the issues that really matter and work in authentic partnership with Te Whatu Ora, Hauora ā Toi Bay of Plenty to participate in real change, with patients and whānau at the centre.



INDIAN INSPIRED STUFFED PEPPERS

INGREDIENTS:

120g red lentils, dried 1 onion, finely chopped 1cm fresh ginger, grated 1 teaspoon ground cumin 200g basmati rice 850ml boiling water

Serves: 4

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 2 garlic cloves, crushed or finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon tomato puree
- 1 teaspoon garam masala
- 1 low salt vegetable stock cube
- 20g mint leaves, fresh

8 peppers (red, yellow and orange are best)

METHOD:

- * Heat oven to 200 degrees Celsius. Wash the dried lentils and then drain and set aside.
- * Heat the oil in a large saucepan. Add the onion, garlic and ginger, then gently cook on a low heat for 5 minutes until softened. Stir in the tomato puree and spices and cook for a further 1 minute.
- * Add the rice and stir well to coat in the flavours. Make up the vegetable stock and pour it over the rice. Bring to the boil then add the lentils
- * Cover the saucepan with a lid and leave to cook over a low heat for 15 minutes until the lentils and rice are cooked. Roughly chop and stir through the mint.
- * Slice the top off each pepper, cut out the middle stalk and scoop out the seeds. Carefully trim the bottoms of the peppers so that they stand upright, ensuring the filling will not fall out.
- Fill each pepper carefully with the mixture and place the lid on top. Cook in the oven for 25-30 minutes or until the peppers have softened and begin to colour. Serve two per person.


