KIDNEY HEALTH MONTH

March is Kidney Health Month with World Kidney Day on March 10th. We have a busy month planned, working with numerous organisations and people around the country. Our nurses will be starting the month off by presenting an education session to Kaumatua in Wellington, testing MP's on the steps of Parliament, testing in Masterton and following up with events throughout the next few months.

Leah, our social media coordinator, will be holding a series of Zooms (Zui = Zoom hui) for donors who can sign up through the Kidney Donor Whānau Facebook group. These will be for donors to share their experiences with kidney donation.

Kidney Health New Zealand is involved in an exciting fundraising partnership with Stabicraft which involves the auction of a boat, motor & trailer package. The boat build will commence in mid March, during Kidney Health Month and will

be auctioned in late April/early May with proceeds going to supporting Kidney Health New Zealand's mahi. Paul Adams, the founder of Stabicraft has recently had a kidney transplant and is wanting to contribute back through engaging the support of his management team and suppliers. NEWS BITES

Fourth Covid Vaccination

The Ministry of Health have updated the advice regarding booster vaccines for immunocompromised people. Once you have had your third vaccine, you are now able to get your fourth dose/booster after three months. Kidney Health New Zealand highly recommends getting your booster as soon as you are able to as this gives you the best protection against the Omicron variant of Covid.

Transplant Project Update

KHNZ published the results of its contracted project with NZIER to quantify the cost of transplants versus dialysis in November 2021 and summarised the pitch to ministers to both properly fund the New Zealand Blood and Organ Service to increase transplants and



to achieve equity of transplantation in New Zealand. KHNZ is now asking for your help in undertaking phase two and three of the campaign. Phase two aims to ensure that every MP in New Zealand is aware that a transplant is the best treatment for end stage kidney disease, that equitable access needs to be achieved and that achieving both will save both lives and dollars. Phase three aims to ensure everyone in New Zealand is aware of these facts and that not funding more transplants continues to cost lives and many millions of dollars.

Pasifika Festival

In March 2021 we attended the Pasifika Festival at Western Springs Park. Erica, our national education manager, provided free renal health tests. We were the only health organisation that attended, and it was very successful.

We were hoping to go again this year, but unfortunately it has been cancelled again. We are very much looking forward to attending next year.



Te Puia Springs Dialysis Unit

After two years of discussions and planning, a much needed and long-awaited self-care dialysis unit has opened in Te Puia Springs on the East Coast of the North Island. Patients needing dialysis living near Te Puia have been commuting daily to Gisborne Hospital or living throughout the week in Hamilton in order to attend Waikato Hospital. The trip used to be a three-hour round trip to Gisborne, three times a week, but now it is only a few minutes commute. This will positively impact patients as such long drives are extremely draining, even more so with needing dialysis.

Rural and Remote patient experience study - Associate Professor Rachael Walker



Associate Professor Rachael Walker has completed a study funded by KHNZ into patient experiences based in rural and remote locations throughout New Zealand. A number of articles will be published in journals in the near future and KHNZ will share links to these publications through upcoming newsletters. The study was very confronting and exposed the lack of support and loneliness felt by patients who

live at considerable distance from their treating centre. Patients described pre-dawn starts to journeys for appointments and treatment that meant returning home very late or staying over. Some patients felt that they had no choice but to move permanently closer to their hospital and were then some distance from their whānau and community. The travel also meant they couldn't contribute to their community.

Our goal is to raise awareness through speaking at these meetings and hopefully be able to work together in the future. Exploring experiences of stress, anxiety, depression and isolation for those experiencing dialysis at home

- What is the emotional and social impact of doing home dialysis?
 - What are the causes of stress for you and your family?
- Are you currently doing home dialysis or have done it in the past?
- How can we provide better kidney specialist services to people who are doing home dialysis?

Please help us find out!

What we know so far:

Home dialysis impacts physical and emotional wellbeing of patients, carers and families. We know that psychological health is important to patients and is not always recognised or addressed in dialysis services. We don't really know how psychological health, such as stress, depression and anxiety, affects people involved in home dialysis.

What we want to know:

We want to understand the impact of home dialysis on your psychological health.

Why do we want to know this:

We want to support better health outcomes and psychological wellbeing for people doing home dialysis.

We want to talk to:

- people who are doing home dialysis or have done it in the past
- carers and whānau of people who are doing home dialysis

We invite you to take part in research that explores your experiences and thoughts about psychological health hinengaro when doing home dialysis in Aotearoa.

If you agree to take part in this study we will:

- Organise a zoom, skype or phone interview with you (and any whānau / friends you wish to also attend) to explore your thoughts, beliefs and experiences of home dialysis.
- We will provide a \$50 supermarket voucher as a koha (as a small appreciation of your time and sharing your story).
- We will use the information we gain from the interviews to explore potential ways to improve kidney health services and policy in New Zealand.

You will be interviewed by Sandy Hay (a dialysis nurse) and/or Rachel Haselden (a social and health researcher). The Lead Researcher is Assoc Prof Racheal Walker at EIT, Hawke's Bay
